Knowing whether a source of energy is renewable or non-renewable is important when considering energy and/or sustainability. Renewable energy is defined by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency thus: "Renewable energy includes resources that rely on fuel sources that restore themselves over short periods of time and do not diminish" (Source: U.S. EPA).

Energy is used for heating, cooking, transportation and manufacturing. Energy can be generally classified as non-renewable and renewable. Over 85% of the energy used in the world is from non-renewable supplies. Most developed nations are dependent on non-renewable energy sources such as fossil fuels (coal and oil) and nuclear power. Non-renewable energy resources cannot be replaced - once they are used up, they will not be restored (or not for millions of years). Non-renewable energy resources include fossil fuels and nuclear power. Fossil fuels. Fossil fuels (coal, oil and natural gas) were formed from animals and plants that lived hundreds of millions of years ago (before the time of the dinosaurs).

Examples of renewable energy include wind power, solar power, bioenergy (generated from organic matter known as biomass) and hydroelectric, including wave and tidal energy. What is renewable energy? Renewable energy is energy that comes from a source that won"t run out. They are natural and self-replenishing, and usually have a low- or zero-carbon footprint. Examples of renewable energy sources include wind power, solar power, bioenergy (organic matter burned as a fuel) and hydroelectric, including tidal energy.

Nonrenewable energy comes from sources that will run out or will not be replenished in our lifetimes--or even in many, many lifetimes. Most nonrenewable energy sources are fossil fuels: coal, petroleum, and natural gas. Carbon is the main element in fossil fuels. The term contrasts with non-renewable energy, which comes from sources that eventually deplete. The Natural Resources Defense Council or NRDC has the following definition of the term: "Renewable energy, often referred to as clean energy, comes from natural sources or processes that are constantly replenished."
