

Sol fa system

Tonic solfa notation, also called Solfège, is a system of learning music where the tones are called do, re, mi, fa, so, la, ti. A hand gesture is assigned to each syllable. ... "Do re mi fa so la ti do" are the tonic solfa names of the notes in a major scale. The pitch of the notes depends on whether you're using a fixed do or a movable ...

Today, Tonic Sol-Fa is known as a system of sight-singing. Tonic Sol-Fa was created by D. Sower in the 1830s but was developed and pioneered by others as not only a system of sight-singing, but also for music notation. In Tonic Sol-Fa, the notes of a major or minor scale are defined or named independent of their starting note or scale.

Solmization began with Guido d'Arezzo's hexachordal system in medieval times. The syllables were ut, re, mi, fa, sol, and la. These syllables were derived from the Latin hymn "Ut Queant laxis" or "A Hymn to Saint John" attributed to Paulus Disconus around 770 A.D.

In the sol-fa system, notes are represented using sound syllables that were derived from an old hymn to St. John and time would not permit me to take you way back into the history. But, here are the syllables: do, re, mi, fa, sol, la, and ti

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Then, fa, sol and la would be repeated to also stand for their modern counterparts, resulting in the scale being 'fa, sol, la, fa, sol, la, mi, fa'. The use of 'fa', 'sol' and 'la' for two positions in the scale is a leftover from the Guidonian system of so-called 'mutations' (i.e. changes of hexachord on a note, see Guidonian hand).

The son of a Congregational minister, he was himself a minister from 1838 until 1864, when he began to devote himself to propagating his new method of musical nomenclature.
